1. Greenland criticized an "aggressive" trip planned by U.S. officials.

This week: National security adviser Michael Waltz and second lady Usha Vance will visit the island as Trump continues his push to acquire it from Denmark.

Zooming out: Trump says Denmark isn't protecting Greenland. And Trump is prompting U.S. allies to rethink their dependence on American weapons.

One more thing: Russian President Vladimir Putin commissioned a "beautiful portrait" of Trump.

2. Senior tax officials are bracing for a potential 10% drop in revenue.

Why? It's tied to changing taxpayer behavior and U.S. DOGE Service cuts. Meanwhile, the IRS is nearing a deal with ICE to share addresses of suspected undocumented immigrants.

In other news: Elon Musk's DOGE seems to have exaggerated claims of fraud in Social Security. And Trump said he didn't sign a controversial proclamation — so who, or what, did?

3. The death toll in Gaza passed 50,000 people yesterday.

What to know: The milestone comes less than a week since Israel broke the ceasefire with Hamas. Experts say the Gaza Health Ministry's figure is probably an undercount.

What now? Israel is considering a new ground operation in Gaza that could include a months-long military occupation — but it hasn't been able to destroy Hamas.

4. Pope Francis made his first public appearance in five weeks.

What to know: Francis was released from the hospital yesterday after a bout with double pneumonia and two respiratory episodes that almost cost him his life.

The appearance: The pope seemed alert but weakened. He waved and thanked a crowd of well-wishers from a balcony of the hospital in Rome.

5. Families are finding out from the JFK files that their relatives were CIA assets.

What to know: Records about President John F. Kennedy's assassination, released last week, are revealing how people's parents, grandparents and spouses took part in spycraft.

Zooming out: The unredacted records uncovered other CIA secrets and provided historians with threads to pull on to help them understand the 1963 assassination.

6. The men's college basketball Sweet 16 is set.

So far, few surprises: Arkansas, coached by John Calipari, is the lowest seed (10th) to advance. And the defending champs lost. Games resume Thursday.

Today: The women wrap up their second round, with games starting at noon Eastern.

In other sports news: The Major League Baseball season is upon us, and we have some bold predictions.

7. A lightbulb in California has been burning for 124 years.

What you're looking at: The Centennial Bulb, named in 2001 when it marked its 100th consecutive year of illumination. It hangs at a fire station in Livermore.

How has it survived? It runs at a low wattage and was made with long-lasting filaments. It cost 40 cents in 1901 and shows no signs of burning out just yet.
