#### 1. President Donald Trump is stepping up efforts to send troops to Democratic cities.

**Last night:** Trump's plan to deploy troops to Portland suffered a legal setback. It followed a weekend of confrontations between protesters and federal agents in the Oregon city.

**In Chicago:** A woman was shot by federal agents, sparking angry demonstrations.

What else to know: An ICE arrest revealed the hidden past of an Iowa school's superintendent.

## 2. Israeli and Hamas officials are in Egypt for high-stakes ceasefire talks.

**The latest:** The sides are negotiating a Trump-backed plan to end the war and release Israeli hostages, which Hamas accepted Friday with conditions. Some Palestinians are hopeful.

**In the U.S.:** Many American Jews are critical of Israel's actions in Gaza, a Post poll found, with about 4 in 10 saying Israel is guilty of genocide. Others feel a tighter bond with Israel.

### 3. Senators return to D.C. today with no shutdown deal in sight.

Where things stand: The government shutdown is entering its sixth day. Shutdowns have become familiar to Americans over the years, but this one isn't normal.

What are Democrats doing? Some are embracing all-out confrontation with Trump.

Meanwhile, federal workers are miserable: The shutdown could be the last straw.

### 4. The Supreme Court starts its new term today.

What to expect: Justices are headed for a showdown with Trump. After months of emergency rulings, they now face giving final verdicts on some of Trump's core policies.

**Major cases:** Justices will consider the legality of Trump's tariffs and possibly his bid to end birthright citizenship. They'll hear challenges to a "conversion therapy" ban for minors.

### 5. Military veterans are swamping the U.S. government with dubious disability claims.

**A Post investigation:** While most veterans' claims are legitimate, our reporters found millions for minor or treatable afflictions — including hair loss, jock itch and toenail fungus.

**Another Post exclusive:** Officials are considering a plan to limit disability benefits for older people by eliminating age as a factor in deciding whether someone is capable of working.

#### 6. Costco is now selling Ozempic and Wegovy at discounted prices.

**Why?** As sales of copycat drugs soar, Danish pharmaceutical company Novo Nordisk wants to head off competition. Costco members can get the drugs for \$499 a month out-of-pocket.

**Thinking of taking a weight-loss drug?** They can help you shed pounds and manage health issues, but there are side effects.

### 7. "Saturday Night Live" ridiculed Trump and Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth.

**The highlights:** The show's 51st season opened with a skit about Hegseth's military meeting. And host Bad Bunny mocked MAGA backlash to his upcoming Super Bowl halftime show.

**Zooming out:** "Resistance" comedy struggled to find its mojo in Trump's second term. But, after Stephen Colbert's cancellation and the Jimmy Kimmel uproar, that is changing.
