# 1. U.S. citizens are getting caught up in President Donald Trump's immigration operation.

**In the Chicago area:** Several Latinos say they have been detained by officers asking where they were born. The actions come as Trump is upping his anti-immigrant rhetoric.

**Two Post exclusives:** The mom of Karoline Leavitt's nephew spoke out about her ICE arrest. And Cuban detainees were beaten for refusing removal to Mexico, the ACLU said.

As Trump's crackdown continues: Many leading Democrats are staying quiet.

# 2. Trump hosted the Kennedy Center Honors last night.

**How did it go?** The president won cheers and laughs from a MAGA-friendly crowd. He joked about nominating himself for the honors next year.

**Zooming out:** The night capped a dramatic year at the D.C. arts institution, which Trump took over in February. The center is now showier, emptier and more political.

On Saturday: SNL mocked Trump and Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth.

# 3. Venezuelan President Nicolás Maduro is trying to wait out Trump.

**What's happening?** Five months into a U.S. military buildup in the Caribbean, Maduro is refusing to go into exile. However, he is fearful of a U.S. strike or an attempt on his life.

**What else to know:** Trump has threatened military action against Venezuela over claims the country supports the drug trade. But Trump keeps pardoning drug traffickers.

# 4. Child deaths under 5 appear to be increasing for the first time in decades.

**According to a new study:** The number of children worldwide who die before turning five is set to rise this year — the first time this century that child mortality has increased.

What's driving the increase? Cuts to aid from several countries are a key factor, researchers said. That includes the U.S., which has slashed foreign assistance under Trump.

#### 5. Scientists discovered a powerful new way to combat the effects of aging.

**How?** By triggering stem cells to create and deliver new mitochondria to damaged and aging cells. Mitochondria play an important role in health and diminish with age.

What it could mean: With further research, the method could be used to supercharge a patient's cells to fight diabetes, muscular dystrophy, Alzheimer's disease and more.

# 6. The College Football Playoff bracket is set.

**What to know:** Indiana, Ohio State, Georgia and Texas Tech each received first-round byes in the 12-team tournament that begins Dec. 19.

**Prefer the other football?** After an elaborate draw Friday (and special prize for Trump), the 2026 World Cup groups are decided. The U.S. men will face some familiar foes.

# 7. Spotted lanternfly "poop" is changing the taste of some honeys.

**How?** Bees are collecting a sticky secretion left by invasive lanternflies and carrying it to their hives. The result is a darker, mysterious new kind of honey.

**What's it like?** A professional taster said it has a smoky, savory, salty, resinous or lightly fruity flavor. Others say the "insect-poop honey" tastes very weird.
